
How to spot a fake Weber

Following numerous requests from concerned Weber owners, we have decided to produce a quick reference sheet showing the differences between a Genuine Spanish Weber carburettor, and a Far Eastern fake carburettor.

The pictures below show the fake product on the left and the Genuine Spanish Weber carburettor on the right. Whilst similar in appearance, there are a number of detail differences, and identifying these will enable you to ascertain if the product you have or are considering purchasing is a Genuine Spanish Weber carburettor that will add performance and value to your car, or a poorly made copy.

The carburettor shown is a 40IDF 70S which is the type most often copied.



- Galleries directly below the starter cover on a Genuine Spanish Weber are cast closed to ensure fuel cannot leak. On a fake they simply use inserted plugs.
 - Auxilliary venturies on a Genuine Spanish Weber are recessed approx 5mm from the carb top face. On a Fake carb they are approx 10mm proud of the face
 - Starter blanking plates on a Genuine Spanish Weber are cast aluminium and feature the **WEBER** name, **W** logo and the legend **Made in Spain**. The Fake has a plain steel plate.
 - The Genuine Spanish Weber has the type **40IDF70S** and the legend **Made in Spain** on the left hand base flange. The fake doe not have these markings
- 5 The Genuine Spanish Weber has the **W** logo and the name **WEBER** cast on the outside of both chokes. The fake does not.
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The Genuine Spanish Weber has the legend **by LCN (CE)** on the right hand base flange. The fake does not have these markings.
